

Tech Talk With Ed Lytle

How An Auto Change Regulator For Two LP Tanks Works



The Manual Indicator Switch handle points to the LP tank that was first activated. If the tank is still ac-

tive, the **Indicator Site Glass** will be **GREEN**.

If the **Indicator Site Glass** shows **RED**, that means one tank has been emptied and the regulator has **automatically** switched to the other tank.

For example:

- The Manual Indicator Switch pointing to L.P. Tank #2, meaning it was first activated.
- The Indicator Site Glass shows
 Red, meaning L.P. Tank #2 is now
 empty and the regulator has auto matically switched to L.P. Tank
 #1.

And the next steps would be to:

- Move the Manual Indicator
 Switch so it points to L.P. Tank
 #1. The Indicator Site Glass will
 switch back to GREEN indicating
 L.P. Tank #1 is now the active
 tank.
- You would then take **L.P. Tank #2** to get refilled.

The process is reversed when the other tank becomes empty, and so on.

PLEASE NOTE: This Regulator Automatically switches to the next tank. The Manual Indicator Switch is just used to change the Indicator Site Glass from RED to GREEN.

Tip Of The Month: "Y" Not Have A Better Hose Connection?

A helpful suggestion: fill the fresh water hose to evacuate as much air as possible before making the fresh water connection to the TrailManor. I use a right angle elbow on the fresh water connection (at the TM) and a "Y" shut off threaded onto the elbow. When connecting the fresh water hose I open the free end of the "Y" connector to evacuate the air in the hose. The other opening of the "Y" connector is attached to the elbow and opened once the air has been evacuated from the fresh water hose. (Dick Hamel, Blandford, MA)

I just read the July newsletter and I have few things to add about the latches. I have a 2006 Trail Manor 2720 SD and I love it. What I've found is keep the latches lubed it stops them for getting rusted which will make them stick. Next, inspect the springs. I've replaced some that were weak or broken. I hope this helps. (Bill Carreira)
